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THE EMBU COUNTY FINANCE BILL, 2014

A Bill for

AN ACT of the County Assembly of Embu to provide for authority for County Government taxes, levies and other charges, and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto

ENACTED by the County Assembly of Embu as follows—

1. This Act may be cited as the Embu County Finance Act, 2014 and shall come into operation upon publication in the gazette.

2. Unless the context otherwise provides, the following terms shall have the meaning assigned to them

"business" means-

- (a) Any activity in the nature of trade, commerce or manufacture, profession, vocation or occupation.
- (b) Any activity carried on by a person continuously or regularly whether or not for gain or profit and which involves, in part or whole, the supply of goods and services.

"CBD" Means the central business zone of Embu town with the exception of the estates known as Majimbo, Dallas, Majengo, Blue Valley, Kanjuru and Kangaru.

"CEC" means the County Executive Member.

"fee" means any county tax, levy or other charge constituting county revenue.

"Khat Bundle" means a measure of khat not exceeding five kilogrammes.

"penalty" means such punishment in financial terms being the consequence of noncompliance with applicable financial obligations under this Act.

"revenue fund account" means the bank account designated by the county executive committee into which local revenue as defined by the Public Finance Management Act is credited.

"revenue officer" means any person engaged by the county Government on whatever terms for purposes of collecting county revenue. Short title and commencement

Interpretation

"Sub urban" means the immediate environs of the CBD including but not limited to Majimbo, Dallas, Majengo, Blue Valley, Kanjuru and Kangaru.

3. All fees levied under Cap 265 (Repealed) are repealed

4. Annual fees shall be valid for a calendar year

5. Despite the generality of clause 4 —

- (a) Fees and penalties that remain outstanding at the commencement of this Act shall remain due and payable to the County Revenue Fund.
- (b) Annual licenses and permits shall lapse on the 31st December in each year. PROVIDED
- (c) Businesses commencing after June shall attract fifty per cent of the annual permit fees.
- (d) A penalty of 10% of the applicable annual fees shall apply for every month in which the fees remain unpaid with effect from 1st March in each year.

6. It is the duty of a person from whom any fees is chargeable to ensure that such fees are paid, whether or not a demand has been made.

7. For the avoidance of doubt as to the applicable fees within the County, the various commercial centres and their environs shall be zoned into the various categories as indicated in the third schedule to this Act.

8. The fees for single business permits are specified in the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh columns in respect of the business activities defined in the first and second columns of the first schedule.

9. Despite Clause 7, the CEC Member responsible for finance may, with the approval of the County Executive Committee, provide for special permits for multiple businesses within the same premises.

10. The various market rates and charges are specified in the third, fourth and fifth columns in respect of commodities and services specified in the first column of the second schedule.

11. Notwithstanding the generality of Clause 9 —

- (a) Daily and market day charges become due and payable at the commencement of business for that day.
- (b) Tonnage based charges shall be for each trip made
- (c) Periodic rates and charges shall lapse at the expiry of the number of days constituting the period referred to.
- (d) An activity for which the prior approval of the County Government is a requirement shall not commence until such approval is obtained. PROVIDED the approving County Government agent shall communicate the decision in respect of any application within sixty days.

12. The CEC Member for finance shall, with the approval of the County Executive Committee and the County Assembly, prescribe the applicable fees for any activity for which the applicable fees is not provided for in the first and second schedules.

13. The County Executive Member responsible for Trade may publish regulations:

- (a) Appointing market days in respect of various market centres.
- (b) Establishing management structures for County markets

14. A person or entity that defaults on payment of any fees shall have committed an offence punishable—

- (a) In the case of single business permits, by a fine of ten percent per month of applicable annual fees
- (b) In the case of market charges, by impounding of commodities and holding the same in safe custody until fees are paid.
- (c) In the case of advertisements, by a fine equal to three times the applicable fees.
- (d) In the case of all fees related to buildings and constructions, by a fine equal to three times the

applicable fees.

15. All revenue shall be paid into the County revenue fund account.

- **16.** (a) A revenue officer who fails to pay revenue into the county revenue account commits an offence punishable by a fine not exceeding Kenya Shillings two hundred thousand or to a jail term not exceeding one year, or to both such fine and jail term.
 - (b) The CEC Member for finance shall take measures to recover any revenue that is not paid into the county revenue fund account.
- 17. (a) There is established a County directorate of enforcement services whose mandate shall include enforcing compliance with the various revenue measures specified in this Act.
 - (b) The directorate shall be headed by a director, who shall be competitively recruited by the County Public Service Board and appointed by the Minister with the approval of the County Assembly.
 - (c) Despite paragraph (b), the director of enforcement services shall serve for a term of four years renewable once only.
 - (d) The County Public Service Board shall in consultation with the director of enforcement services establish and equip the directorate established under paragraph (a).

18. The officers of the directorate shall be recognizable by the Kenya police service and shall have powers to arrest offenders under any County law.
