#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The National Agricultural and Rural Inclusive Project (NARIGP) is a Government of Kenya and World Bank funded project. The project covers the following 21 counties: Samburu, Turkana, Makueni, Meru, Kitui, Embu, Kilifi, Kwale, Narok, Kirinyaga, Kiambu, Muranga, Nakuru, Bungoma, Trans Nzoia, Nandi, Vihiga, Kisii, Nyamira, Migori and Homa Bay. NARIGP is supporting these counties to increase agricultural productivity and profitability of rural communities for the identified priority Value Chains (VC). The project has four component intervention areas: 1) Support community driven development 2) Strengthening producer organizations and VC development 3) Supporting County Community-Led development and 4) Project coordination and management; Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) and Information Communication and Technology (ICT).

In Embu County the NARIGP project has a total allocation of Ksh 754,140,920 out of which the total disbursement so far is Ksh 333, 490,074 which includes a counter funding of Ksh 22, 861,332 from the Embu County Government.

In the implementation of the NARIGP, several achievements have been accomplished which include the formation of the Community Driven Development Committee in every ward which have acted as the link between the Department and the CIGs/VMGs.

The four Value Chains namely, Mangoes, Dairy Cows, Green Grams and Indigenous Poultry farming were identified competitively through the participation of the residents following the guidelines of Project Appraisal Documents (PAD).

Under the value chains the Two hundred and one (201) Community Interest Groups (CIGs) including some Vulnerable/Marginalized Groups (VMGs) have been formed to undertake various projects. The CIGs had contributed Kenya Shillings Sixteen million four hundred and fifty two thousand, two hundred and fifty eight only (16,452,258) both in cash and in kind towards the Projects that have been approved. In total each ward is supposed to propose thirty (30) micro projects. Out of the possible six hundred (600) projects, only two hundred and seventy four (274) projects have been approved. There were about two hundred and seventy proposals that were yet to be approved.

During the committee deliberations, it was observed that there were no regular reports on NARIGP project implementation submitted to the County Assembly, unless requested by the Committee, which had resulted into an information gap in the Assembly.

Further, the Committee observed that the county executive had interfered with Word Bank Conditions on signatories to the Embu County NARIGP Bank Accounts. The Committee has therefore recommended that the CECM for Finance and Economic Planning should ensure that such interferences do not occur in future.

In an effort to verify the information provided by the department regarding the implementation of the programme the committee decided to visit some sampled Community Interest Groups (CIGs) under NARIGP covering the four value Chains. The visits were done

on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2021 in Runyenjes, Manyatta, Mbeere North and Mbeere South Subcounties. The committee also visited a Mega Project, the Weru Rupingazi Irigation Scheme which, when completed will provide irrigation water to one hundred and thirty seven (137) farmers/households in an area covering 54 hectares. The intake and sedimentation basin were almost complete when the committee visited the site. The main challenge for this project was the granting of permission by Kenya National Highways Authority to tunnel major roads to provide access to the pipeline which was about seventeen Kilometres

The groups/Projects demonstrated knowledge of their place, level and contribution along the respective Value Chain but lamented the cumbersome procurement process which resulted to delay in achievement of important milestones for their projects. It was also evident that some players had not fully been facilitated to carry out their duties.

The Committee urges the Department of Agriculture to ensure prompt implementation of all the projects after noting that the NARIGP implementation period would come to a close on 15<sup>th</sup> December 2021. It has further requested the department to seek for extension where there are compelling and justifiable reasons that many projects would not be completed within the timeframe.

The Committee has also requested the County Executive Committee Member for Finance and Economic Planning to ensure timely disbursement of counterpart funding as per the operational agreement between the County Government and the National Government so as not to compromise on implementation of NARIGP.

In conclusion the Committee avers that with proper implementation of all the Micro-projects proposed in respective Value Chains, the benefits will be immense and will impact a substantive number of people in Embu.

Embu County has received with much appreciation, the NARIGP programme which has made a lot of impact in the wards especially in the Agricultural sector. Several projects have been undertaken in all the twenty wards.

However, dissemination of information on implementation status of the donor funded programme, NARIGP has not been forthcoming especially to the County Assembly.

The NARIGP project has a total allocation of Ksh.754,140,920 out of which the total disbursement so far is Ksh 333, 490,074 which includes a counter funding of Ksh 22, 861,332 from the county.

The Committee notes that where regular and relevant reports are provided and proper oversight is carried out, there will be improved performance, transparency and well informed residents.

It is against this background that the Committee sought information from the executive on the implementation status of the NARIGP projects to inform the Embu residents and satisfy itself that the implementation is being carried out in a transparent and open manner.

- a) To scrutinize the NARIGP projects implementation status report
- b) To consider background information of NARIGP with a view to reporting on compliance with donor conditionalities.
- c) To consider the challenges encountered in the implementation of NARIGP
- d) To make relevant recommendations to the county Assembly

In its analysis, the committee applied the following methods;

- a) Committee meetings.
- b) Interrogation of the NARIGP projects implementation status report
- c) Sampled and toured several projects to confirm the status provided in the report.

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#### 2.0. COMMITTEE DELIBERATIONS

The Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Cooperative Development Committee (ALF&CD) held several sittings to deliberate on NARIGP, a donor funded programme with the aim of evaluating and reporting on how it has been implemented in the county. The Committee sought submissions from the CECM in charge of the department on ALF&CD on the implementation of the programme as discussed in appropriate sections of the report.

The committee later retreated from 9th to 12th December 2020 to compile this report with recommendations for adoption in the Assembly.

#### 2.1 BACKGROUND OF THE NARIGP

National Agricultural and Rural Inclusive Growth Project (NARIGP) is a Government of Kenya initiative funded by National Government, County Government and the World Bank. The project covers twenty one (21) counties with an implementation period of 5 years (2017-2021).

The proposed program supports Kenya's Vision 2030 whose key element is the development of "an innovative, commercially oriented and modern agriculture, livestock and fisheries sector" in an inclusive way.

A key principle of the (NARIGP) is the importance of linking farmer/Common Interest Groups (CIGs) and Vulnerable and Marginalized Groups (VMGs) organized along priority Value Chains (VC) to markets. Thus the three technical components of NARIGP are interlinked.

#### Effective dates

The project was officially launched on 24th January, 2018 in a Workshop organized by the National Project Coordinating Unit (NPCU) in collaboration with World Bank officials at Embu. The baseline year is FY 2017/18, being the initial implementation financial year. However, the activities for the first six months were not achieved as planned due to delays in funds flow at the county level.

The **Mid-term** was May 2019 while the project is expected to end on 15<sup>th</sup> December 2021. Embu County is one of the 21 NARIG Project implementing counties and is classified among the Semi-Arid counties. The project covers the 4 sub-Counties (Manyatta, Runyenjes, Mbeere North and Mbeere South) and is implemented in all the twenty (20) wards.

The Project Development Objective (PDO) is to "Increase agricultural productivity and profitability of targeted rural communities in selected counties, and in the event of an Eligible Crisis or Emergency, to provide immediate and effective response".

The four priority value chains namely, Dairy Cow, Chicken, Mangoes and Green grams were identified as having the potential to attain the project development objective.

It is projected that direct beneficiaries across the county are 18,670 households.

# **Project Components**

The NARIGP comprise four (4) components which are briefly described below:

# 2.1.1 Component 1: Supporting Community Driven Development

In supporting community driven development, the component aims at the following among other items;

- Strengthening community level institutions (farmer/producer groups, cooperatives, etc.), to identify and implement investments that improve their agricultural production and productivity, food security and nutritional status.
- The Component also aims at reducing vulnerabilities such as unemployment (especially youth, vulnerable women), disability, food insecurity and malnutrition, and improving quality of life (small access roads/bridges, water, etc).
- This component also provide support through two windows aimed at: (a) providing financing for public goods, and; (b) promoting agricultural and rural livelihoods as private goods.

# 2.1.2 Component 2: Strengthening Producer Organization and Value Chain Development

- The purpose of this component is to support the strengthening of higher-level farmer institutions (co-operatives, producer organisations, natural resource users associations, etc) that help farmers and communities work together to improve productivity, value-addition, achieve efficiency and economies of scale of local activities.
- The component also supports activities that require cooperation within and across multiple communities. Key activities proposed under this component include:
  - (i) Build Producer Organizations (POs) capacity to support member Common Interest Groups (CIGs) and Vulnerable /Marginalized Groups (VMGs) to develop selected priority Value Chains in targeted rural communities.
  - (ii) POs formed from CIGs and VMGs formed under Component 1 will be strengthened to become viable, profitable and attractive to business partners in input, output, and service markets.

# 2.1.3 Component 3: Supporting County Community-led Development

- The intention of the component is to support and strengthen the capacity of County governments to support community-led development initiatives identified under Components 1 and 2.
- Enable county governments to establish mechanisms for effective citizen engagement through consultations, sensitizations, capacity building and partnerships.

# 2.1.4 Component 4: Project Coordination and Management Monitoring and Evaluation

The components entails;

- I. Project Coordination and Management
- II. Monitoring and Evaluation including the ICT platform
- III. Contingency emergency response provision to mitigate against any natural disaster striking the country to disrupt project implementation.

# 2.2 SUBMISSION OF THE CECM ON IMPLEMENTATION STATUS OF NARIGP

The CECM for ALF&CD in his various responses, the latest of which was dated 18<sup>th</sup> November 2020 ref no. ECG/AGRIC/ALFC.COMM./VOL.1/68 provided projects' implementation status as at October 2020. Members perused through the voluminous responses as had been requested by the committee where the following information was gathered.

#### I. Identification of Value Chains

The county identified four value Chains to be funded through NARIGP after a thorough selection procedure and ranking of proposed value chains. The selection was a very participatory process undertaken at county and community level as follows:

- a) Formation of the Value Chain Selection Committee
- b) Rapid Review and Analysis of Value Chains
- c) Participatory Value Chains Selection and Ranking in the Sub counties
- d) Participatory vetting and selection of Value Chains at County level
- e) Ratification and approval of selected Value Chains by CPSC.

# Criteria for selection of Value Chains

The following criteria was used to guide in selection of the value chains

- i. Growth potential in both domestic and export market
- ii. Production growth potential within the county
- iii. Potential Outreach to targeted smallholder farmers
- iv. Competitiveness (e.g. yield, gross margin and value)
- v. Potential for social inclusion (e.g. women, youth, elderly, etc.)
- vi. Nutrition Sensitivity
- vii. Resilience to climate change
- viii. Nutrition Security and Food Security
- ix. Captured in County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP)

After a thorough selection process which included; Secondary data gathering analysis, Rapid review and analysis, value chains ranking in the four Sub-counties the following top four value chains in each sub-county were prioritized as shown below;

In summary, the total number of value chains that were subjected for vetting and ranking at the County level were as follows:

1. Dairy cow; 2. Indigenous poultry; 3. Bananas; 4. Maize; 5. Goat Meat; 6. Sorghum; 7. Green grams; 8. Macadamia; 9. Avocado.

From the above table the four (4) value chains prioritized were:

- a) Indigenous Poultry
- b) Dairy
- c) Green grams
- d) Avocadoes

It was however recommeded that Avocadoes be replaced with the Mangoes value chain in realignment with the Project Appraisal Documents (PAD).

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# II. Summary of Activities under Each Value Chain

The CECM further provided the activities/projects that could be considered for funding under the prioritized value chains as follows;

# A. Mango Value Chain

The main activity include Capacity building and value addition with various sub activities as follows;

- i. Production and Disease Control
- ii. Value addition to include grading and packaging
- iii. Processing e.g. extraction of juice
- iv. Market research and market linkage
- v. Storage to increase shelf life and reduction of post-harvest losses
- vi. Construction of collection structures to hold the produce.

## B. Dairy Value Chain

The proposed activities include;

- i. Breed improvement
- ii. Quality and quantity production of milk
- iii. Cooling and chilling milk through coolers
- iv. Collection of milk / transport
- v. Capacity building
- vi. Value addiction and Extended Shelf Life Milk (ESLF)
- vii. Marketing and linkages

#### C. Green Grams Value Chain

Capacity building and value addition with various sub activities including the following:

- i. Quality and Quantity production
- ii. Sustainable
- iii. Threshing and transpiration
- iv. Storage and Post-harvest losses
- v. Capacity building
- vi. Marketing, Research and Development
- vii. Cooperative development

#### D. Indigenous Chicken

Capacity building and value addition with various sub activities including the following:

- i. Quality and quantity production of chicken
- ii. Feed formulation
- iii. Slaughter slab
- iv. Transportation
- v. Marketing and market linkages

# III. Details of Activities under Component 1 - Supporting Community Driven Development.

The CECM for Agriculture provided details of the process followed in the formation and formalization of the Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) as explained hereunder;

# a) Formation and formalization of the Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) for the twenty wards.

The Committee sought to know the process which was employed by the department in the formation of CDDCs. The CECM responded as follows;

That after identification of the targeted project wards in the county, the County Project Coordinating Unit (CPCU) engaged the respective communities in a rural participatory planning/mobilization process at ward level. The mobilization entailed, empowerment, creating awareness, training, and development of action plans. This was done through a participatory field survey on the community resources, constraints and opportunities using a Participatory Integrated Development Process (PICD that incorporates several participatory and learning tools including Participatory Analysis of Poverty and Livelihood Dynamics (PAPOLD). This process was carried out in all the 20 Wards.

The objective of the PICD process is to ensure all community members participate in identifying the community issues/problems, developing plans and generating solutions for the same.

During the PICD process the Wards were divided into four Zones. Eight opinion leaders were identified in each Ward with the help of Chief to serve as guides.

The PICD process steps included the following:

- 1. Collection, review and analysis of available information
- 2. Identification of information gaps
- 3. Carrying out field survey to collect missing information and verify some of the secondary data.
- 4. Identification of the Vulnerable and Marginalized Groups (VMGs)
- 5. Analyzing the information (Problem Analysis)
- 6. Development and endorsement of Community Development Plans/Micro-catchment Action Plans (CDPs/MCAPs)
- 7. CIGs formed around four priority value chains through the promotion of opportunities approach.
- 8. Formation of Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) in each ward to undertake the following;
  - i. Act as liaison between community and the CPCU and CPSC
  - ii. Ensure that community mobilization continues beyond the initial stages of the PICD process.

- iii. Registering a Community Based Organization (CBO) bearing the name of their respective Wards. The membership of this CBO constitutes all the CIGs/VMGs enlisted with NARIGP in that Ward.
- iv. Development of by laws that will guide implementation of community micro projects as detailed in the project documents (PAD, PIM and community grants management manual)
- v. Sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with County Government.
- vi. Open a Bank Account with a commercial Bank.

# b) Guidelines for formation and qualifications for membership to the Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs).

This is the third level in the overall institutional structures for implementing NARIGP. As part of the Participatory Integrated Community Development (PICD) planning process, the targeted communities will be assisted to establish a Community Driven Development Committee (CDDC) to run the ward micro-projects.

# The following attributes were considered when electing CDDC members;

**NB:** The bona fide CDDCs were elected by the CIGs/VMGs that enlisted for the NARIGP micro projects and with the following attributes:

- i. Must have participated in the entire PICD process
- ii. Must have firm grasp of the CDPs/MCAPs
- iii. Must be trustworthy and well-respected members of the community
- iv. Must be literate and demonstrate willingness to be trained in management of Community-Driven Development (CDD) activities.
- v. Must have been involved in successful agricultural activities
- vi. Must be willing and available to volunteer and commit their time to community work (Expecting no payment or salary)
- vii. Should be able to communicate in Kiswahili or English
- viii. Should have community mobilization skills.

# In electing members to CDDC, the guidelines provided that the following were to be avoided;

- i. People in full employment
- ii. Current and aspiring politicians
- iii. People involved in past fraud in any community project or venture

# Election of CDDC

The following conditions/criteria were followed;

- i. Each value chain elected three (3) officials who constituted a twelve (12)-member value chain committee at the ward level.
- ii. Therefore, for the four (4) VCs, there were forty eight (48) elected VC leaders who nominated twelve (12)-CDDC members. In addition, it was a requirement for a VMG representative and two (2) Ex-Official members (either Water Resource Users

- Association, local chief, ward administrator, or a CBO), and one (1) PO representative making a total of 16 CDDC members.
- iii. Other conditions were that, the CDDCs elections were to be supervised by the SCTTs, and Gender and Social Services Department (GSSD) to take lead in the elections, with an administrator overseeing.
- iv. The elections were to be democratic and transparent.
- v. The CDDC will be managed by an executive committee of five (5) people at most i.e. Chairperson, Vice chairperson, Secretary, Vice secretary and Treasurer who were to be elected the same day by the fifteen (15) CDDC members.

# c) Responsibilities and duties of the Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs).

- i. Act as liaison between community and NARIGP
- ii. Implement the approved CDP and MCAP as per the CGM and ensure transparency and accountability
- iii. Vet micro-project proposals from the CIG/VMGs ensuring compliance to project safeguards
- iv. Prepare and submit regular progress and financial reports (Monthly/quarterly) to the CPCU
- v. Procure all micro project goods and services
- vi. Submit detailed activity schedule for all micro-projects to the county
- vii. Ensure participatory monitoring and evaluation by the community members and provide feedback to the county
- viii. Disclose fully or make available any information as may be required by NARIGP, County Government or their appointed agents
- ix. Be responsible for grievance redress and conflict resolutions that may arise from the communities as per the grievance redress guidelines
- x. Ensure the required community contributions are provided as stipulated in the CGM
- xi. Networking and resource mobilization
- xii. Oversee selection of beneficiaries under the employment programme and monitor timely wage payments.

Each CDDC has four sub-committees which include; Executive, Procurement, Finance, Monitoring and Evaluation.

## d) List of all the members of the twenty (20) Ward CDDCs

The CECM submitted a list of members of the CDDCs which included the ward, Name, National identification number, phone number, and the village *{See Annex 1}.* 

# e) Identification and selection of the 201 Community Interest Groups (CIGS) from the twenty Wards.

i. The CECM submitted that after investment opportunities were promoted and interested farmers enlisted themselves as Common Interest Groups (CIGs/VMGs)

Report of the Committee on Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Cooperative Development on the Status of Implementation of Projects under the National Agricultural and Rural Inclusive Growth Project (NARIGP) as at October 2020.

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- along the four priority Value Chains namely: Indigenous Chicken, Dairy Cow, Green Grams and Mangoes.
- ii. The CIGs/VMGs then elected interim CDDC committee. The immediate role of the interim CDDC was to continue with sensitization of the community on NARIGP and also the enlisting of CIGs/VMGs with NARIGP. For a group to be enlisted with NARIGP it had to align its objectives with those of the project, be registered as a CIG and have at least thirty (30) members and also select a value chain of interest.
- iii. After the Interim CDDC forwarded the list of the enlisted CIGs/VMGs, election for the bona fide CDDC was then conducted. The bona fide CDDC was charged with the immediate role of mobilizing communities and enlist more CIGs/VMGs and also coordinate proposal development by the enlisted groups in line with CDPs/MCAPs validated during the PICD process.
- iv. Each Ward had a target of thirty (30) proposals

## Proposal Development Procedure

CIGs/VMGs through facilitation of their Sub County technical Teams (SCTTs) developed concept papers from prioritized issues in the CDP and presented them to CDDC.

The concepts papers are presented to SCTT for consideration during which the following is assessed:

- i. How well the project addresses priority community needs identified in the CDP.
- ii. The number of people (men and women) to be reached by these benefits.
- iii. The involvement of the vulnerable or disadvantaged groups in the proposed project
- iv. Contribution that the CIG/VMG is willing to make to the proposed project
- v. Current activities of the CIG and the involvement of members in these activities
- vi. Compliance with NARIGP guidelines on micro-projects.

The compliant concept notes were then developed into a full proposal by the groups using a proposal Template provided in the Community Grants Manual.

Vetting of the proposals was done at the CDDC level. The compliant proposals were forwarded to the CPCU which forwards them to County Technical and Advisory Committee (CTAC) for Validation and recommendation.

The proposals recommended by CTAC are the forwarded to the County Project Steering Committee for approval and authorization for Funding.

However as requested by the Committee, the department submitted a detailed list of the 201 CIGs containing the Micro-project proposed title, number of males and females in the group, value chain, contribution by the community and by NARIGP, names and contacts of the Chairperson and Secretary for each CIG. (See Annex 11 – list of the 201 Groups)

## f) The procurement process for group's requirements.

The group's procurement is done by a Procurement Committee consisting of three members who are not part of the executive sub-committee.

#### The roles of this committee are;

- i. Procure all goods and services which meet the requirements of the micro-project
- ii. Responsible for floating, opening and adjudication of bids, tenders and quotations.
- iii. Ensure that the procurement process is guided by the principles of economy, efficiency, equal opportunity, transparency and openness.
- iv. Maintain a stock register
- v. Inspect, verify and issue goods and services procured to users using the stock register
- vi. Supervise, maintenance and servicing of equipment and endorse payment for such services rendered.
- vii. Ensure proper installation of equipment and/or machinery where necessary.
- viii. Take custody (storage) of goods, identify any obsolete and non-functioning inventories and make recommendations for disposal.
- ix. Ensure that the premises intended to house the machinery and equipment are identified, renovated and or rehabilitated and all the necessary agreements and contracts are signed before they are procured.
- x. Ensure that the assets of the organization are secure and insured.

# g) The details of the bank account for CDDCs including the name of the bank and signatories and account balances as at 30th June 2020.

The CECM reported that all CDDCs have bank accounts at Kenya Commercial Bank, Embu Branch. The signatories are the Chairman, Secretary and the Treasurer who is a mandatory signatory.

# IV. # A. Process of Formation and Formalization of the Seven Producer Organisations (POs)

# The criteria for PO selection were as follows:-

- 1. Relevance to selected priority value chain
- 2. Number of beneficiaries/CIG/VMG/other farmer organizations
- 3. Level of market orientation (MOPE 0-3)
- 4. Market growth potential
- 5. Area coverage by the PO
- 6. Level of support received from other sources. The aim of this criterion (support from other sources) was to ensure complementarity and to avoid duplication.

Using the above criteria there were seven (7) POs selected in various value chains as shown in the table below.

# B. Formal Engagement of the POs and with the County Government

The Committee was informed that all the Seven (7) POs entered into a formal engagement /MOU with the county Government which was signed between the Chief Officer Agriculture on behalf of the County government.

Under the agreement each party has a role to play as stipulated in the Project Implementation Manual (PIM) which are as below:-

# C. Obligations of the County government

- i. To provide training and technical assistance to PO's
- ii. To make resources available to the PO for implementation of projects.
- iii. To carry out periodic supervision and inspection, implementation support and M&E of PO activities funded under county government and NARIGP.
- iv. The county government may terminate the right of people to use NARIGP funds.

# D. Obligations of the Producer Organization

In the first six months of implementation, the PO will become eligible for allocation of NARIGP resources upon compliance with the following minimum conditions:

- a) Signing of MOU with the county government
- b) Opening a separate bank account dedicated to the project with a commercial bank acceptable to the World Bank, with the chairperson and treasurer of the PO as mandatory signatories.
- c) Undergoing training organized under the project on policies and procedures governing management of the PO.

After implementation, to be eligible to continue receiving NARIGP resources, the PO will be required to meet the following minimum set of conditions:

- i. Demonstrate that the PO is making good progress in the expansion of its membership to eligible farmers targeted under the project within the areas of the POs jurisdiction
- ii. PO contribution to support sub-projects as outlined in the project grants manual, ;
- iii. Timely submission of quarterly project technical and financial reports for the previous six months.

# The PO is expected to;

- 1) Apprise, carry out and verify its activities under the project with due diligence and efficiency in accordance to guidelines as detailed in the PIM
- 2) Maintain policies and procedures adequate to enable the county government, the recipient and the world bank to monitor the progress of its activities under the project and the achievement of project objectives
- 3) Enable the county government, recipient and the World Bank such information as reasonably requested relating to the performance of the project and
- 4) Exercise its rights and perform its obligations in implementation of the projects in the community in such a manner as to protect the interests of the county government the recipient and the World Bank, and to accomplish the purposes of the projects.

The PO shall carry out activities in accordance with agreements set out in this MOU and use funds within eligible expenditure areas and adhere to environmental and social safeguards as outlined in the PIM

The PO shall ensure that all reporting including financial and technical reports are compiled and submitted as per guidelines in the PIM and ensure a proper compilation of any complaints on issues of environmental and social safeguards, procurement, fraud and corruption.

#### VII. IMPLEMENTATION STATUS AS AT OCTOBER 2020

The CECM for ALF &CD submitted the implementation status of the NARIGP program as at October 2020 as follows;

# A. Achievements under Component I- Supporting Community Driven Development.

- i. Started with Participatory Integrated Community Development (PICD) process in all twenty (20) wards of the County.
- ii. Prepared the Community Development Plan (CDP) and Micro Catchment Action Plans (MCAP) in all the 20 wards.
- iii. Formalized Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) in the 20 wards where all CDDCs were registered, trained and Bank Accounts opened.
- iv. All CDDCs have successfully played the role of liaison between the community and NARIGP.
- v. In support of community driven development, 274 micro project proposals have been developed, approved and funded at a cost of KSh. 109.8 million disbursed to the twenty (20) Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) in the 20 wards (see Table 13).
- vi. To increase ownership and for sustainability, the beneficiaries make community contributions depending on the categories they will be involved in (see Table 14). The total number of funded Micro projects cutting across the different categories is shown in *Table 15*

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- vii. The procurement process for implementation is ongoing for the 274 funded micro projects. Another total of 270 micro project proposals is awaiting approval by County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) for more funding to the communities as shown in *Table 16*
- viii. Farmer Field School (FFS) training has been undertaken for a hundred and six (106) FFS facilitators, Eighty (80) Community Based Facilitators and twenty six (26) Technical Staff from the wards). These will facilitate the Common Interest Groups (CIGs) in the implementation of their micro projects in the field using the Farmer Field Schools (FFS) approach.

# Component 2 Objectives:

- i. Build Producer Organizations (POs) capacity to support member Common Interest Groups (CIGs) and Vulnerable /Marginalized Groups (VMGs) to develop selected priority Value Chains in targeted rural communities.
- ii. POs formed from CIGs and VMGs formed under Component 1 strengthened to become viable, profitable and attractive to business partners in input, output, and service markets.

Under Component 2, seven existing POs/Cooperatives have been funded with the inclusion and membership grants totaling KShs. 5,957,020 as shown in *Table 17 below*.

The designs, Bills of Quantities and the Environment and Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) report were being prepared so that the investment gets full approval.

# C. Achievements under Component three- Supporting County Community-Led Development

#### Component 3 Objectives:

- i. To strengthen the capacity of county governments to support community-led development initiatives identified under components 1 & 2.
- ii. Enable county governments to establish mechanisms for effective citizen engagement through consultations, sensitizations, capacity building and partnerships

In Component 3, proposals have been developed for the following Multi Community Investments (MCI) projects:

- i) Weru-Rupingazi Irrigation Project is already under implementation.
   (Environment & Social Impact Assessment report approved, NEMA License, KeNHA permit & Kenya Forest Services permit).
- ii) Desilting of Gitinangugu Concrete dam Environment & Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) is awaiting clearance by the World Bank for the advertisement of the tender.
- iii) Itiira Kagumori Earth dam has received conceptual approval at the National level; Designs, BQs and the Environmental and Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) report are being developed.
- iv) Forty (40) Youths were trained on Participatory Education Theatre (PET) and later participated in the Road Show to sensitize the community all over the county on the NARIG Project objectives & philosophy.

v) Six (6) sensitization workshops have been held where Members of County Assembly (MCAs), County Technical Departments representatives and 4 at Sub-county level have been sensitized.

# D. Achievements under Component four (4)-Project Coordination & Management, Monitoring & Evaluation

The component entails:

- i. Project Coordination and Management
- ii. Monitoring & Evaluation including the ICT platform
- iii. Contingency emergency Response provision to mitigate against any natural disaster striking the country to disrupt project implementation.

- a. 52 youths and 60 Monitoring & Evaluation Subcommittee members have been trained on Open Data Kit (ODK) digital data collection and have collected baseline data for 17,525 households.
- b. A total of 554 micro project proposals have been screened for Environmental and Social Safeguards compliance.
- c. Office renovation is complete, ICT equipment procured (4 desk computers and 9 laptops), Liquid–Crystal Display (LCD) Projector, photocopier, Printer, Two (2) motor vehicles issued-GK B488V &GK B489V.

#### VIII. FUNDS RECEIVED AND UTILIZATION

NARIGP project in the county has a grand total allocation of KShs. **754,140,920**. Since project initiation, the county has received KShs. **310,628,742** from the National government and KSh. **22,861,332**, from the County giving a total disbursement of KShs. **333,490,074** while the total utilization is **KShs. 235,314,213** as shown in table below.

# IX. CHALLENGES FACED DURING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF NARIGP. The CECM for ALF&CD submitted the following as the key challenges in the implementation of NARIGP;

- (i) The prevailing COVID-19 crisis limiting person to person contact thus slowing implementation of project activities.
- (ii) Inadequate facilitation of Community Driven Development Committee (CDDCs) and Subcommittee meetings and travel.
- (iii) Low numbers and aging technical staff numbers in the sub-counties and wards thus leading to an overload for the staff facilitating micro projects in Component 1.
- (iv) Slow Implementation of Multi Community Investments due to lengthy processes and procedures before full approval and implementation.
- (v) Procurement process at community level taking too long due to delay in community contribution by the Common Interest Groups (CIGs).

### 3.0 REVIEW OF VISITED VISIT TO SAMPLED PROJECTS IMPLEMENTED THROUGH NARIGP IN THE SUB-COUNTIES

The Committee visited sampled projects/Community Interest Groups (CIGs) under various value chains in the four sub-counties of Embu County on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2021. The Committee was interested in the following areas per CIG;

- 1) Group description and activities being undertaken
- 2) Materials and equipment supplied through NARIGP
- 3) Funding
- 4) Group Achievements and Level of Implementation
- 5) Challenges
- 6) Proposed solution and way forward

#### 3.1 Kathuriri Dairy cow project

#### 1. Project Description and other activities

- a) The group was formed in 2016 where members were involved in welfare activities, Merry go round, Table banking and assisting needy members.
- b) In 2017 members joined a Farmers Field School (FFS) funded by Rukuriri Tea Factory in collaboration with the department of Livestock. The committee covered the following areas among others; Environment Conservation, Tree Planting, and Rearing of Dairy Cattle. Most of the group members became interested with dairy cow rearing.
- c) The group established a common tree nursery for indigenous trees and fodder seedlings which were later transplanted in their farms and sold to their neighbours.

- d) To address the perennial shortage of feedstuff/fodder especially during dry spells, the group, in 2019 accepted invitation from NARIGP to work with them. This was to address shortage of animal feed/ fodder along the Dairy Cows production Value Chain.
  - a. The group identified production of Rhodes Grass to address the animal feed problem in the area and where possible spare some for sale to their neighbours to earn money for the group.

#### 2. Funding

- a. It is one of the twelve groups which received the funding during the disbursement of the first tranche in 2020.
- b. The group has been allocated Ksh 445,000

#### 3. Group Achievements

- i. The Group has leased one (1) acre of land to grow the Rhodes grass at a cost of Ksh 50,000 for 5 years. The cost was shared equally between NARIGP and the Group.
- ii. Have undertaken the growing of Rhodes grass on demonstration plots where it is grown under controlled environment for comparison purposes. For-example a plot where fertilizer or manure only has been applied or where there is no fertilizer or manure etc. This helps the group members to make decision on application of manure and or fertilizer of both.
- iii. The training has increased knowledge among group members and farmers in the community.
- iv. The group has contributed twelve (12) tonnes of manure to the project.

#### 4. Materials and equipment supplied through NARIGP

The group was supplied with the following under the NARIGP Programme;

- a) Motorized Chaff cutter
- b) Manual Hay Baler
- c) Pulveriser
- d) Manure
- e) Fertilizers (Calcium Ammonium Nitrate (CAN) and Diammonium Phosphate (DAP) 3no. bags each)
- f) Personal Protective Equipment PPEs (Gumboots, overalls, Gloves, headgear, Dust masks)- 5 pairs for each.
- g) Hay store is not complete reason being iron sheets and semiskilled labour have not been procured. Some materials already in site include; Offcuts, posts, sand, cement and fine concrete.

#### 5. Level of Implementation

The group assessed its implementation level at 90% arguing that Rhodes Grass had been grown and was only awaiting harvesting.

#### 6. Challenges

- i. Proposal making was a big challenge
- ii. Cumbersome procurement process wrought with bottlenecks caused delays in availing the goods required by the project. In some instances materials procured were substandard.
- iii. Some very good trees were cut to pave way for planting of Rhodes grass but were not paid for or taken for use by the project.
- iv. It was not possible to get at least a single acre of land to lease for planting of Rhodes Grass. The CIG was therefore forced to acquire two pieces of land which are far apart making their management difficult.
- v. The Community Based Facilitator, has not been facilitated to do his duties as required. He has not been provided with stationeries and transport for four months.

#### 7. Way forward/

- I. The project can be a source of job opportunities if the government can increase funding of the project.
- II. Mechanism to be worked to ensure suppliers and semiskilled labour are sourced from the local area.
- III. The group pleaded that county government consider providing them with improved breeds or be provided with semen to improve what they have.
- IV. That the group be supported as a learning centre for the community.

#### 1) Project Description and other activities

- a. The Green Searchers Youth Group started in 2013 as a youth group in the mango production before it was brought on board to the NARIGP Platform.
- b. The Scope of the project is to prepare and manage mango seedlings nursery so as to produce (ten thousands) 10,000 seedlings to increase production of Mangoes along the Mango Value Chain.
- c. Group members are encouraged to plant many seedlings on their farms to be a good example to the community.
- d. The group gives loans to its members and also undertakes table banking.

#### 2) Funding

- i. Group has been funded to the tune of Ksh 419,950 disbursed in tranches.
- ii. The community has however contributed Ksh 76,450 (half of it was in cash and the other half in kind by providing unskilled labour)
- iii. NARIGP Contribution= Ksh. 343,500
- iv. 1st Tranche = Ksh 137,400
- v. 2<sup>nd</sup> tranche= Ksh. 206,100
- vi. The second tranche has not been released because the group has been unable to contribute Ksh 7500 towards 10% as per the guidelines.

#### 4) Implementation status

The group assessed its implementation status at 40% noting that the nature of its project makes absorption of Funds difficult.

#### 5) Achievements

- a. Several trainings have been undertaken by the group with the help of NARIGP.
- b. The group has sold two thousands eight hundred (2800) seedlings. (Sold at Ksh 100per seedling if not grafted and at Ksh 200 when grafted). The amount realised was ploughed back to the project.
- c. The balance of the seedlings in the nursery at the time of the visit was 3500no.

#### 6) Challenges

- a. Grafting of seedlings
- b. Lack of adequate water and lack of adequate storage was cited as the biggest challenge.

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- c. Delay in procurement of items.
- d. Dwindling membership

#### 7) Proposed Solution

- a) That the group be assisted by training them on grafting techniques.
- b) That county assists the group in finding solutions to the perennial problem of lack of enough water and storage of the same.

- i. Mutunduri Bidii CIG is three years old. However the Group started in 2017 where members were involved in merry go round and related activities.

- iv. Transportation of the procured materials to the project site poses a challenge because of the terrain.
- v. Proposal making was a big challenge and some very crucial items/activities were left out.
- vi. That field officers had not received their allowances and other supplies to facilitate them as required.

#### 1. Project Description and other activities.

Weru – Rupingazi Irrigation Project is a project mooted to be undertaken in two phases. The first phase involves providing irrigation water to 137 farmers/households in an area covering 54 hectares. The main line is seventeen Kilometres (Kms) made of 355mm and 315mm pipes. However, the distribution lines up to the farm are made of pipes of various sizes.

#### 2. Funding

- i. Total project budget for Phase One is Ksh. 137,965,712.97.
- ii. The amount paid so far to the Contractor for 1st Certificate is Kshs. 86,162,127
- iii. Phase One requires a Counterpart fund from the County of Kshs. 48,000,000

#### 3. Achievements, Materials and equipment supplied through NARIGP

In the Bills of Quantities (BQs), the contractor was to rehabilitate the existing head works but on further investigation and analysis of how it works, it was found that the water could only enter the intake during flooding since the canal invert level was at the same level with the weir. To rehabilitate the intake box would mean destroying the old one and deepening for one metre. This would mean double cost for demolition and reconstruction.

In view of this, the Resident Engineer (RE) consulted with the management of the project and the consulting engineer and agreed instead of demolishing the old intake to construct a new one. So the RE produced the design and the BQs for the new intake chamber and the rehabilitation of the sedimentation basin. The cost of the total works is **Kshs. 1.2M** 

Initially it had been estimated that repair of the community intake and renovation of Sedimentation Tank would cost **Ksh 290,000**. However after the community intake was declared not suitable, the Engineer and the Project team agreed with NARIGP that contingency funds could be applied to the construction of a new intake tank. Therefore the amount to be funded from contingency fund would be **Ksh 910,000** (**Kshs. 1.2M** – **Ksh 290,000**).

#### **CHALLENGES:**

#### The main challenge was in meeting the statutory compliance requirements:

- i. KENHA has still not issued approval for micro-tunneling of the Embu-Meru and Embu-Kitui tarmac road Wayleave.
- ii. Project Time Frame of 6 Months
- iii. The project has lost cumulatively a total of 2 months and in view of this the contractor has been directed to issue a revised work plan detailing how he plans to have all the works executed on time.
- iv. County has not released counterpart fund to the project.

Report of the Committee on Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Cooperative Development on the Status of Implementation of Projects under the National Agricultural and Rural Inclusive Growth Project (NARIGP) as at October 2020.

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#### 4.0 COMMITTEE FINDINGS AND OBSERVATIONS

The Committee made the following findings and observations after perusing the submissions by the CECM for Agriculture, Livestock Fisheries and cooperative Development and after undertaking a field visit to assess the status of sampled projects under each value chain in respective components;

- 1) THAT NARIGP project in the county has a grand total allocation of Kenya Shillings Seven Hundred and Fifty Four million, One Hundred and Forty Thousands and Nine Hundred and Twenty shillings (Ksh 754,140,920) out of which the county has received Three Hundred and Ten Million, Six Hundred and Twenty Eight Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty Two Shillings (KShs.310, 628,742) from the National government and Kenya Shillings Twenty two million Eight hundred and sixty one Thousand Three Hundred and Thirty Two (KSh. 22,861,332), from the County as a counterpart fund. Out of the total disbursement of Kenya Shillings Three Hundred and Thirty Three Million, Four Hundred and Ninety Thousands and Seventy Four (KShs. 333,490,074) while the total utilization is Two Hundred thirty Five Million, Three Hundred and Fourteen Thousands and two Hundred and Thirteen (KShs. 235,314,213). The rate of absorption was lower than expected.
- 2) THAT the County Executive had not sensitized the residents properly on the advent of the National Agricultural and Rural Inclusive Project (NARIGP) programme in Embu County thereby denying many residents a chance to participate in the programme.
- 3) THAT Members of the County Assembly were not involved in picking of opinion leaders during the Participatory Integrated Development Process (PICD), formation of Community Driven Development Committees (CDDCs) and identification of Producer Organizations (POs). These activities were left to the National Government Officials (Chiefs) alone when the MCAs, being elected leaders would have made a contribution in choosing the opinion leaders.
- 4) THAT the projects identified under the four Value Chains, Mangoes, Indigenous Poultry, Green grams and Dairy, within the four Components would greatly benefit the people of Embu if properly implemented within the timeframe.
- 5) THAT there was inadequate funding especially on the facilitation of transport to members of CDDCs who were constantly required to report at the headquarters to comply with the processes and procedures of the programme.
- 6) THAT under Component One, a total of two hundred and seventy four (274) micro projects proposals had been approved for funding and total disbursement for the micro-projects amounted to Kenya Shillings One hundred and nine million, eight hundred and four thousands one hundred and fifteen (Ksh.109,804,115) as at October 2020. Two hundred and seventy (270) micro-projects were yet to been approved.

- 7) THAT under Component two, the Seven Producer Organisations, being established Cooperative Societies, were selected for funding at Ksh 55.7Million. This was after the approval had been given to upgrade their respective value chains. However, the Committee observed that only Kenya Shillings Five Million, Nine Hundred and Fifty Six Thousands, Five Hundred and Twenty Ksh 5,956,520 had been disbursed so far to the seven POs as at October 2020.
- 8) THAT under Component three (3), the implementation of the Multi Community Investments (Mega Projects) has been characterised by stagnation, inefficiency and delay owing to the lengthy processes and procedures in approval from one stage to the next of the implementation cycle.
- 9) THAT under Component four (4), several achievements had been made including;
  - A. Fifty youths and sixty M&E Sub-committee members had been trained on use of Open Data Kit (ODK) for digital data collection where baseline data for 17,525 households had been collected.
  - B. A total of 554 micro-project proposals have been screened for Environmental and Social Safeguards compliance
  - C. Office renovation had been completed, ICT equipment were procured (4no. desk computers and 9no. laptops), LCD Projector photocopier, printer, Two motor vehicles issued GK B488V and GK B489V.
- 10) THAT there were no details of the management Team for Itiira Kagumori Earth Dam, a mega project under Component three.
- 11) THAT the Two Hundred and one (201) Community Interest Groups (CIGs) including some Vulnerable/Marginalised Groups (VMGs) had contributed Kenya Shillings Sixteen million four hundred and fifty two thousand two hundred and fifty eight only (16,452,258) both in cash and in kind.
- 12) THAT the County Executive had interfered with the World Bank conditions on signatories to the Embu County NARIGP Bank Accounts, where the NARIGP Coordinator was replaced as mandatory signatory by the Chief Officer for Finance, which led to temporary suspension of disbursement of funds to the County (Annex III 'a' and 'B')
- 13) THAT the NARIGP project implementation status was behind schedule by a considerable period of time noting that the mid-term for the project was May 2019 and the project was expected to end on 15th December 2021.
- **14) THAT** the County had in the past delayed in disbursing counterpart fund for the NARIGP as contained in the agreement between the County and the National Government on implementation of NARIGP in Embu County.( (Annex III 'D')

- **15) THAT** there were no regular reports on NARIGP project implementation submitted to the County Assembly by the Departments of Agriculture and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC).
- **16) THAT** the Community Interest Groups (CIGs) visited by the Committee, demonstrated understanding of their places along the Value Chains and contribution of their projects to the success of the respective value chains.
- 17) THAT, although an elaborate competent technical structure had established by NARIGP to support the CIGs at the grassroots level, there was some disquietness amongst the Community Based Facilitators because they had not been facilitated fully to carry out their work of training farmers and attending to their concerns in the Farmer Field Schools.
- **18) THAT** the CIGs raised the challenge of cumbersome procurement process wrought with bottlenecks which delayed implementation of the projects and in some cases this proved quite fatal where the project involves provision of chicken feed among others items.
- 19) THAT some projects had not accessed subsequent funding (2<sup>nd</sup> tranche) because they had not raised the required contribution for them to access the funds. The committee noted that some CIGs had not raised as little as Ksh 7,500 to unlock the release of second tranche of their allocation.
- **20) THAT** the County Executive had to a greater extent complied with NARIGP conditionalities.

#### 5.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee considered the findings and observations and recommended a raft of measures which are enumerated below.

- 1. THAT the CECM for ALF&CD and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) should put in place proper mechanisms to ensure timely absorption of the disbursed funds by the identified groups.
- 2. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD should in future ensure proper dissemination of information regarding programmes that require the participation of the members of the public so that deserving and interested residents are not left out from such programmes.
- 3. **THAT** in future the CECM for ALF&CD should ensure full involvement of the elected members of the County Assembly in the launching of various programmes in the Wards, being the opinion leaders and representatives of the electorate and also for their information.
- 4. **THAT** CECM for ALF&CD should ensure that the NARIGP Programme is implemented transparently and effectively so that identified benefits could accrue to the residents of Embu.
- 5. **THAT** CECM for ALF&CD and the CPSC should revisit the need for the members of the CDDCs to constantly travel to the headquarters to avoid incurring avoidable costs or an alternative be worked out so that the Department receives information and periodical returns without the need for physical meetings.
- 6. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD should ensure that the approval of the remaining Two Hundred and Seventy (270) micro projects is expedited by the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) for them to start implementation of the projects.
- 7. **THAT** CECM for ALF&CD should ensure that Environment and social Impact Assessments, NEMA Licences, Designs, Bills of Quantities and necessary clearances are prepared and approvals obtained for the respective projects to take off.
- 8. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) makes deliberate effort to address the bottlenecks and bureaucracy bedevilling the implementation of Multi Community Investments (Mega Projects) under Component three (3).
- 9. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD should ensure that all equipment and machinery acquired through NARIGP are utilized properly and efficiently during the project duration and after the programmes comes to an end.
- **10. THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) should ensure that all CDDCS, CIGS/VMGs POs and the Multi Community Investments (MCI) have their Management Teams in place to ensure implementation of their respective projects without glitches.

- 11. THAT the CECM for ALF&CD should in future consider waiving monetary contributions from Vulnerable/Marginalised Groups (VMGs) as some members are physically challenged and or belong to the lowest rung in the society's ladder economically.
- 12. **THAT** the County Executive Committee Member for Finance and Economic Planning should ensure that World Bank conditions on signatories to the Embu County NARIGP Bank Accounts and any other conditions are adhered to otherwise any interference or non-adherence might lead to suspension in release of funds to Embu County among other consequences.
- 13. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) should ensure that all projects are implemented and completed before the expected closing date (15th December 2021). Where there are justifiable reasons, extension should be sought to complete the projects outside the project implementation period.
- 14. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) carryout a study to determine the real and perceived impact of the NARIGP in Embu County to inform on modalities for decision making and implementation similar projects in future.
- 15. **THAT** the County Executive Committee Member for Finance and Economic Planning should ensure timely disbursement of counterpart fund as per the operational agreement between the County Government and the National Government so as not to compromise on implementation of NARIGP.
- 16. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and the County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) should ensure relevant and regular reports on NARIGP project implementation are provided to the County Assembly and relevant Stakeholders detailing the relevance of the projects, level of achievement of the project objectives, impact and sustainability among other items.
- 17. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD should ensure that the players involved in providing technical assistance to farmers in the Farmers Field Schools have been fully facilitated and equipped to provide the services they were hired for.
- 18. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) should address the challenge of cumbersome procurement process with a view to ensuring that materials and implements are provided at the right time to the projects/CIGs
- 19. **THAT** the CECM for ALF&CD and County Project Steering Committee (CPSC) develop a mechanism on how the CIGs could access the second tranche of their funding to help them absorb funds before the NARIGP Programme comes to an end.

#### 6.0 CONCLUSION AND ADOPTION

# RE: NON-COMPLIANCE ISSUES IN THE NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL AND RURAL INCLUSIVE GROWTH PROJECT IMPLEMENTING COUNTIES

During the 4<sup>th</sup> Implementation Support Mission, the project was rated satisfactory. However, the mission observed various non-compliance issues such as non-adherence to the county participation agreement, non-compliance to Finance management guidelines, retaining balances at the CRF beyond the allowable 15 days, non-remittance of counterpart funds, operating more than one project accounts at different commercial banks and non-compliance to the Finance manual on the signatories to the commercial bank account. These non-compliance issues have adversely affected the smooth implementation of the project and may lead to ineligible expenditures. The mission recommended immediate sanctions to non-compliant counties including immediate suspension of disbursements.

In addressing non-compliance issues in your county, we request counties to provide evidence of the corrective action as summarized below:
